



The decadent romance of old Boston inspires a new décor

The colors and textures of new Boston nightclub Saint evoke an old speakeasy's rendition of sin. "Originally, the concept was a modern speakeasy. That evolved into a boutique 'nitery," says the creator of the space, Boston-based designer Stephen Sousa whose firm bears his name. Appropriately, the location nestled beneath the Copley Square Hotel was also once home to a smoky 1950s jazz club (Billie Holiday frequented) and more recently Café Budapest. Given that history, coupled with Boston's colorful flapper-and-bootlegger past, the themes of decadence and salvation came easily.

But turning the themes into a cohesive interior design that unifies the 7,600-square-foot space begged a unique solution, says Sousa, who also designed Boston bars Tonic and Sky. "I had to reinterpret what that [type of] nightclub would be now. We faced tying the rooms together with some sort of dialogue."

The result was three, color-driven lounges ranging from white to blue to hellfire red signifying Purgatory, Heaven, and Hell. And the color-coding provided the common thread.

After entering down a stairwell, guests can pause in a round central hall—this transitional space Sousa says, "creates a threshold between street and nightclub." Here patrons ponder their path through the club: This is Purgatory, of course, with white marble floors, woven mesh (similar to a mini chain link fence) cascading down silver plaster walls, and white columns adorned with shiny steel balls painted white. To either side is one of two doorways leading to Heaven and Hell.

In a leaping juxtaposition from the entrance, Hell (also known as the Bordello room) is deeply, darkly red. Lusty scarlet hues cover every corner including the ceiling. Red chenille-and-mohair backed barstools, maroon Old World carpeting, and elaborately ornate gold mirrors abound. Black faux leather banquettes stretch along walls covered in crimson fabric; honey-colored, backlit, stained glass lines the bar. Two "VIP pods" hide behind sheer drapes; their walls are covered in either silver or gold venetian plaster. Each nook appears overflowing with plush beds, seducing loungers.

On the other side of Purgatory lie the pearly gates where Heaven features luminous floor-to-ceiling sapphire columns, which stand guard over a "communal" coffee table. Heavenward, wavy ceiling mirrors—reminiscent of a carnival—add depth and movement to the space. An LED backlit indigo base anchors a bar lined by ebony, harlequin-backed stools.

Sousa views the project as a bold departure from what's come before, but with a smart design cause. "We were trying to reinvent the nightclub," he says, "especially in the Boston demographic where a lot of minimalist design gets dated very quickly." hd
